


Historic Columbia



Overview

Like a vast majority of structures on the 1600 block of Main Street, 1607 Main was constructed around between 1872 and 1884 to replace the structures lost in the

conflagration of 1865. In 1936 the façade was changed to house the State Theater, which opened in July of that year to become the fifth theater on Main Street. It was opened in response to the monopoly that had taken over the downtown theaters, which were all owned by the Palmetto Amusements Co. In the advertisement announcing




Cultural/Historic Significance

From 1884 until at least 1910 the rear third, which was later demolished, housed a warehouse, while the rest of the building was used as a grocery and hardware store during

that same time period. Sometime before 1888 T.

B. Aughtry opened a grocery and hardware store, which lasted until 1917 when the Columbia Cafeteria opened. Run by a widow named Floy Bratton until 1932 or 1933 the restaurant closed and the building was vacant for two years until the State Theater opened in 1936². The theater showed 2-3 pictures a week at 20 cents each, mostly older releases, which was a common



practice at the time for what was considered a middle-tier theater. The State Theater closed in 1961, to be replaced by Fox Theater in the same building in 1962. Opening with the musical "West Side Story," Fox Theater attracted moviegoers with its rocking chair seats and its prime downtown location. One of several theaters on Main Street, this building and others like it represented the vitality of Columbia's commercial core.

Though the theater would have been closed to blacks in its earliest years, the Fox along with other Main Street theaters desegregated in 1963. By the 1970s, five movie houses dominated the west side of Main Street in the few blocks above the State House, and a sixth was located on the east side. To increase attendance the Fox added a second theater in the balcony section. Around the same time, it began offering second-run movies for

Overview

In the mid 1930s a conglomerate of sponsors came together to hold the "New American Home Contest" in which 9000 architects submitted their idea of a custom built home complete with modern features and conveniences. Of the applicants, 1000 designs were chosen to be built, one of which was submitted by the well-known Columbia firm of Layfaye and Layfaye, which had built other Columbia buildings such as the World War Memorial, The Township Auditorium and the Wade Hampton State Office Building. The winning home was built at 2626 Stratford Road and opened to great fan fair and media

attention for its many new electrical and mechanical features¹.

Architectural Overview

Designed in the Tudor Revival style, the home brought attention to the new suburb of Forest Hills in which it was erected. There are many defining stylistic features on this house including
